ARNAR AWARDED \$40,000 NEA FELLOWSHIP

Anna Arnar, Art and Design, has been awarded a 12-month fellowship from the National Endowment of the Humanities with a stipend of \$40,000.

Arnar plans to begin the fellowship in June of 2005 to work on a book manuscript with the title "Facets. The Book in the Work of Stéphane Mallarmé."

The project examines Mallarmé's life-long engagement with the concept of the "Book" that he envisioned as a catalyst for profound social change. This change was to be initiated by the process of reading, an activity he believed could empower readers as independent creative agents. In Mallarmé's work, the book assumes many different forms: from rare collectible art objects, unbound folio sheets containing typographical constellations, utopian theatrical productions, to a bomb.



The research project is partly based on Arnar's 2000 dissertation, but will contain new chapters devoted to late 19th-century anarchist philosophy and the development of utopian pataphysics in the works of Alfred Jarry, Marcel Duchamp and others.

DRAGONS INDUCT FIVE INTO HALL OF FAME

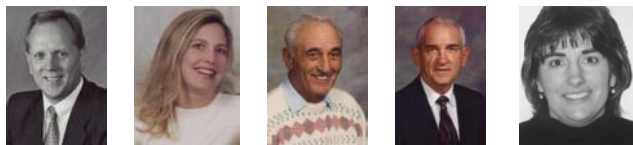
Five athletes who charted memorable careers on and off the athletic field will be inducted into the Minnesota State University Moorhead Dragon Hall of Fame on Saturday, February 14.

Kris DeClerk Thompson, Andy McCarty, David Robley, Len Varriano and Julie Willoughby Stone will be honored by the Dragon Athletic Department at an Awards brunch at 1:30 p.m. at Comstock Memorial Union in Moorhead.

The selection increases to 109 the number of inductees in the Dragon Hall of Fame. The legendary Alex "Sliv" Nemzek was the charter

member in 1961. A closer look at the induction class of 2003:



A native of Windom, **DeClerk** transferred to MSU Moorhead from Minnesota, Crookston and starred in basketball and volleyball. She collected NAIA and KODAK honorable mention All-American basketball honors as a senior and twice was voted the Dragons' Most Valuable Player. She set the single season scoring record with 570 points in 1991-92, and still holds the career scoring record of 17.6 ppg. A three-time All-NSIC basketball pick and a two-time All-NAIA District 13 selection, DeClerk is a teacher and coach in the Buffalo school system.

A graduate of Ortonville High School, **McCarty** played linebacker and halfback at Moorhead State Teachers College in 1955-56. He coached 32 seasons of high school football, and produced 166 career victories. McCarty led Park Rapids High School to four Mid-State Conference football championships and produced five all-state players. He coached 23 years in track, and guided the Panthers to the 1987 Minnesota State True Team Championship. He developed 50 conference track champions and 12 state place winners and was active as a wrestling official as well. He is retired and lives in Park Rapids.

A Pelican Rapids native, **Robley** was decorated with NAIA All-American honors in the pole vault for matching sixth place finishes at the NAIA Indoor Track Championships in 1981 and 1982. He was voted the Most Valuable Fieldman in 1982, and served as a tri-captain as a senior. Robley reached 16-3 in the vault outdoors and 16-1 indoors, and helped the Dragons sweep to NSIC Indoor and Outdoor titles as a senior. Robley is the Douglas County Public Works Director/County Engineer and resides in Alexandria.

A Dilworth native, **Varriano** played both offense and defense during his collegiate football career at Moorhead State, and was one of the Dragons' leading hitters in baseball as well. He was named to the 1954 All-NSIC football team and was elected Dragon football co-captain as a senior. He was honored as the Top Football Official by the State of Colorado's High School Football Coaches Association and officiated in all classes of the state football playoffs. He is retired and lives in Greeley, Colo.

A native of Motley, **Willoughby** charted a prosperous career in track and cross-country at MSU Moorhead. She became the first women's individual national champion at MSUM, winning the 5000-meter title at the 1984 NAIA Outdoor. Her long distance portfolio also includes a runner-up finish in the 3000 meters at the 1983 NAIA Indoor, a third place in the two-mile at the 1984 NAIA Indoor, a fifth in the 5000 meters at the 1983 NAIA Outdoor, and a sixth in the 5000 at the 1982 NAIA Outdoor. She collected NAIA Cross-Country All-American honors for a 24th place finish in 1982, and was named to All-NSC and All-NAIA District 13 teams as well. She resides in Ramsey.

A Faculty Development workshop Feb. 24.... COLLEGE LIFE AT A PUBLIC INSTITUTION

An MSUM Faculty Development Committee workshop on "2004: College Life at a Public Institution" will run from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, Feb. 24 in room 214 of the student union.

During the workshop, Cliff Schuette will share information about our students from psychological, emotional and social perspectives.

Carolyn Zehren, Financial Aid, will share information about our students from the financial perspective.

And Dave Olday, Sociology and Criminal Justice, will provide a historical perspective about MSUM students.

The program will be followed by a student panel providing student perspectives at 4:30 and an open discussion from 5 to 5:30 p.m.

Some of the questions considered:

- * Do some MSUM students reflect a McDonaldized-like society characterized by values such as convenience and efficiency?
- * Do some MSUM students reflect a society that values consumerism and materialism?
- * Do some MSUM students reflect an educational system that rewards performance with extrinsic rewards (points and grades) and undervalues learning?
- * Do some MSUM students struggle with being the kind of student they want to be, but because of factors beyond their control (like rising tuition costs and the need to work more hours) they can't be?

Here's a snapshot of current MSUM students:

- * The average debt of graduates has doubled in the past 10 years.
- * The graduating class of 2003 owed an average of \$18,227 in student loans.

- * In a survey of 500 MSUM students, over 50% reported working between 25 and 40 hours a week.
- * State aid is dwindling and higher education costs are increasing.
- * More and more students are struggling with mental health issues.
- * School is but one of many important demands: being from being a parent or a spouse to an employee.
