HUMAN RACE MACHINE, CROSS-CULTURE RESEARCHER HEADLINE 20TH ANNUAL RED RIVER PSYCHOLOGY CONFERENCE

Psychologist David Matsumoto, founder of the Culture and Emotion Research Laboratory and professor at San Francisco State University, will deliver the keynote address on "The Culture Attribution Fallacy" at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 7 in MSUM's new Science Lab Building 104 to open the 20th annual Red River Psychology Conference.

His talk, free and open to the public, kicks off the two-day event that will also feature the appearance of artist Nancy Burson's one-of-a-kind creation, The Human Race Machine. It's an interactive computer console, which looks like a kiosk, that scans a digital image of your face and then transforms it so you can see what you'd look like as five different races.



The Human Race Machine will be set up in the MSUM psychology department Wednesday through Thursday (April 6-7) and then in the student union all day Friday during the conference. It's free and open to the public.

The machine was the cover story in a 2003 issue of Scientific American and has been at the New York Hall of Science.

Matsumoto, also a world-renowned judo coach and official, is a specialist in cross-cultural research, the author of several books on the subject and a consultant to international businesses in intercultural training. He'll also deliver the conference luncheon address at noon Friday in the student union ballroom on "Ideology vs. Reality: One of the Problems of Cross-Cultural Psychology." (For luncheon tickets contact Christine Malone 477-2804. The talk itself is free and open to the public.)

The Red River Psychology Conference is an annual event hosted alternately by the three local colleges and is for undergraduates who present their original research. About 150 are expected to attend the event, which features 50 posters and talk

presentations all day Friday in the student union.

**BONDING BILL EXPECTED TO PASS
LEGISLATURE THIS WEEK: \$10.5 MILLION
FOR HAGEN, \$500,000 FOR MACLEAN**

Under a deal Gov. Tim Pawlenty brokered last week and approved by members of a House-Senate conference committee, a \$885.9 million bonding bill is expected to be passed by the Legislature this week.

Sen. Keith Langseth, DFL-Glyndon, the Senate's chief public works negotiator, got everything he wanted for his Moorhead-centered district, including \$10.5 million to renovate MSUM's Hagen Hall.

The bill also awards MSUM \$500,000 to design a renovation in McLean Hall.

**INTERNATIONAL FILM FEST
CONCLUDES THIS WEDNESDAY**

MSUM's 31st annual International Film Festival concludes this week with another double feature, "Hill 24 Doesn't Answer" and "(West)Germany-The Bridge" starting at 7 p.m. Wednesday, April 6 in Weld Hall's Glasrud Auditorium. Admission is \$3.

At 7 p.m., Israeli director Thorald Dickenson's 1955 "**Hill 24 Doesn't Answer**" (101 minutes)

This is the first film produced in the new nation of Israel. It takes place during Israel's 1948 War of Independence, focusing on the personal stories of soldiers—an Irishman, an American Jew, and a Sabra—who are assigned to defend a strategic hill outside of Jerusalem.

At 8:45 p.m., director Bernhard Wicki's 1959 "**(West) Germany - The Bridge**" (104 minutes)

Based on an autobiographical novel by Manfred Gregor, the film takes place near the end of World War II as a small German town braces for the onslaught of American troops. It focuses on eight schoolboys drafted into the army to defend a bridge leading to their town. The film was nominated for the Best Foreign Film Oscar.

**FISHERY BIOLOGIST KEYNOTES MSUM'S
STUDENT ACADEMIC CONFERENCE APRIL 13**

More than 300 students will present research on 186 topics at MSUM's seventh annual Student Academic Conference Wednesday, April 13 in the student union ballroom.

The purpose of the afternoon event is to showcase the work and talent of MSUM students through presentations, posters, and creative works.

The keynote speaker is Dr. Todd Koel, a 1991 MSUM biology graduate now the supervisory fishery biologist and leader of the Fisheries and Aquatic Sciences Section at Yellowstone National Park. His address starts at 11:50 a.m. in the student union ballroom, followed by a student panel at 12:20 p.m. on the importance of student research.

Koel recruits undergraduates for internships at Yellowstone and involves them with a variety of research projects. A Rollag, Minn., native, he entered MSUM through its New Center program, an academic department that offers an alternative to students who do not fully meet the university's admission standards, but show potential for collegiate success. Koel also holds a master's degree in zoology from NDSU.

Research presentations will run from 1 to 3:50 p.m. throughout the student union. Subjects range from "Nursing Care in Nicaragua" and " Fargo vs. Moorhead: Do Homebuyers Have A State Preference?" to "Gamma Ray Spectroscopy And Its

Application” and “Using Knots To Teach Elementary School Mathematics.”

"Starting Your Own Business" will be offered from 7 to 9 p.m. Tuesday, April 12 at MSUM's Center for Business 109; and from 7 to 9 p.m. Tuesday, April 19 at the Minnesota State Community/Technical College in Fergus Falls, Room L103.

The workshop takes a serious look at starting a business, from analyzing markets and determining capital needs to putting together financial projections and finding and securing capital. It will also cover entrepreneurship and operations.

"Real Estate and Your Business" will be offered from 7 to 9 p.m. Wednesday, April 13 in MSU Moorhead's Center for Business 11; and from 7 to 9 p.m. Wednesday, April 20 in MSCTC Fergus Falls, Room L103.

This workshop focuses on the decisions a business owner makes in acquiring real estate. Topics range from commercial real estate leases and purchases to business brokerage, commercial financing and commercial negotiations.
