## UNIVERSITY PRESSES TOPIC OF DEANS' LECTURE MARCH 2

Pam Werre from the university's Instructional Resources department presents a Deans' Lecture on "**The University of Minnesota Press and the Role of University Presses in Scholarly Publishing**" at 3 p.m. March 2 in the Center for Business 109.

Her lecture will outline the history of university presses and describe some of the challenges they face.



University presses are a vital component in the scholarly communication network consisting of scholars, students, presses, and libraries. They've played a vital role in academic publishing since they were first established in the U.S. in the late 1800s.

Founded in 1925, the University of Minnesota Press has established itself as a publisher of literary and cultural theory, social and political theory, gay and feminist studies, and regional materials about Minnesota and the upper Midwest. Her lecture will briefly outline the history of university presses in the United States focusing on the history of the University of Minnesota Press. She'll also describe the current challenges to the scholarly communication process and some of the current initiatives in place to combat the crisis.

She'll talk on "Restoring Our Spirits: Nurturing Our Inner Lives" at 9 a.m. in the university's student union ballroom, exploring how

to nurture your own sense of purpose and vision and create opportunities for reflection and personal renewal.

Her evening keynote address at 7 p.m. is in MSUM's New Science Lab Building Auditorium, titled, "Creating Ridicule-Free Communities: The Don't Laugh at Me Program."

Afternoon breakout sessions will begin at 1 p.m. at Moorhead High School.

Lantieri is a Fulbright Scholar and nationally known expert in social and emotional learning, conflict resolution, inter-group relations, and crisis intervention.

She's the director of the New York Satellite Office of the Collaborative for Academic Social and Emotional Learning (CASEL), located at the University of Illinois at Chicago. CASEL's mission is to establish social and emotional learning as an essential part of education from preschool.

Lantieri, the co-author of "Waging Peace in Our Schools," has over 30 years of experience in education as a former teacher, principal and director of the alternative middle school East Harlem and as a faculty member of the department of Curriculum and Teaching at Hunter College in New York City.

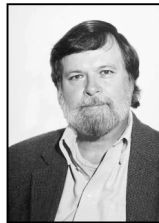

### POET, WRITER TOM MONTAGE READS AT MSUM FEB. 24

Poet and nonfiction writer Tom Montag, author of "*Curlew: Home*" and "*The Sweet Bite of Morning*" will talk about the writer's craft at 4 p.m. in the MSUM library porch and then read from his work at 8 p.m., also in the library porch, on Thursday, Feb. 24 as a feature of the Tom McGrath Visiting Writers Series.



Montag is a middle western poet and essayist who has all along been interested in place and the hold that the land has on us. Much of Montag's poetry reflects his middle western background, from his early long-poem, "Making Hay" to his current series-in-progress, "Plain Poems: A Fairwater Daybook." Montag was editor of *Margins: A Review of Little Magazines* and *Small Press Books* during the 1970s, and an editor and feature writer for Wisconsin's *Fox River Patriot* during its heyday from 1977-1979. With his wife Mary, he edited and published the *Wisconsin Poet's Calendar* 1982-1984.

A poet with ink in his blood, Montag worked nearly a quarter of a century at Ripon Community Printers, Ripon, Wis., for the Lyke family, serving as a pressman, supervisor, training director, and

manager of customer service at the award-winning company. During those years, much of his poetry came in the guise of pithy sayings from a little Oriental fellow Montag calls Ben Zen. Four collections of the BZ poems were published between 1992 and 2000.

In his memoir, *Curlew: Home* 2001, Montag returned to his roots, writing about his first 14 years spent on a farm outside Curlew, Iowa, and about his sense of loss revisiting the community 40 years later. *Curlew: Home* was read on Iowa Public Radio in 2002; a selection from it has been posted for two years on the Prairie Home Companion website. *Kissing Poetry's Sister* (2002) gathered 11 of Montag's essays about writing and being a writer, including his long piece on creative nonfiction. The first of Montag's, "Plain Poems" saw print in *The Sweet Bite of Morning* (2003).

In October, 2002, Montag "retired" from his job in printing to pursue, "Vagabond in the Middle," a five-year attempt to find what makes us middle western.

### PERUVIAN ARTIST LECTURES HERE FEB. 24

Renzo Barchi, a Peruvian artist working primarily with pastels and tempera paint, is the university's visiting artist on Thursday, Feb. 24. He'll give a free, public slide lecture on his work from 6 to 7 p.m. in the Roland Dille Center for the Arts Fox Recital Hall. He'll also give drawing demonstrations and critique sessions for art students during his visit.

Now living in Texas, Barchi was struck with complete amnesia. His haunting pieces are his autobiographical explorations to uncover his past. Barchi's work also reflects his experiences and perspectives on living in the United States.



Barchi came to this country in 1987 to study. After receiving a Master of Arts and a Master of Fine Arts degree from Stephen F. Austin State University in Nacogdoches, Texas, he moved to Houston where he now maintains a studio.

Barchi says, "as an American artist (Latin American that is if you need me to be politically correct) I have always been tied to the expression of my surroundings such as the romantic notion of life, religion, politics and any social concerns. All these elements are deeply rooted in my soul."

This visiting artist is made possible by the Comstock Fund.

### **Women and depression topic of first talk... MSUM WOMEN'S HEALTH SERIES TO FEATURE CURRENT INFORMATION ON WOMEN'S HEALTH**

Approximately 12 million women in the United States experience clinical depression each year, and they experience depression twice as often as men. Depression has been called the most significant mental health risk for women.

To educate men and women about current information on women's health issues, MSUM is sponsoring a Women's Health Series. The first topic will be "Women and Depression" at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 24 in the university's Science Building room 118. Featured speaker is Susan Helgeland, regional director of the Mental Health Association in North Dakota. She'll also offer a free

depression screening. A reception will be held at 6:30 p.m. in the Science Building atrium.

Both are free and open to the public.

The goal of the health series is to provide reliable health information, a forum for discussion, a venue for the exchange of ideas, and a means to empower women to take charge of their own health.

Because of limited medical and pharmacological testing of women during much of our recent history (women were not approved as FDA test subjects until 1992), women's perspectives on health are greatly influenced by results from male physiology. Recently, the medical community has exploded with information directed at the unique control mechanisms that drive female physiology.

Future talks will focus on breast cancer awareness and stress management.
