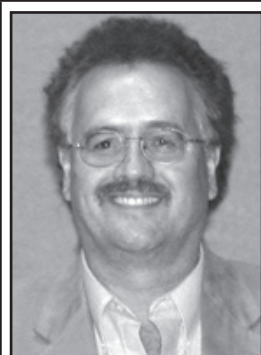

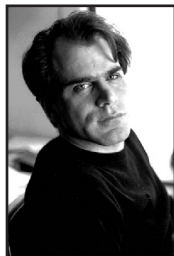

Oct. 3-7.... MSUM OPENS THEATRE SEASON WITH UNIQUE PRODUCTION OF THE CLASSIC 'OEDIPUS/ANTIGONE'

MSUM Theatre kicks off its season with the classic Greek tragedy "**Oedipus/Antigone**" by Sophocles at 7 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday, Oct. 3-7 in the university's Roland Dille Center for the Arts Hansen Theatre.

Adapted and directed by MSUM Prof. Craig Ellingson, the show follows Sophocles' classic 2,400-year-old tale of the doomed Theban king.

In this unique production, the two plays are fused together with a contemporary edge. The Greek chorus has been replaced by media reporters and

royal advisors; the togas have been replaced by Matrix-inspired clothing; and choral chants and odes have been replaced by dance club inspired music, mixed with traditional sounding Greek instruments.

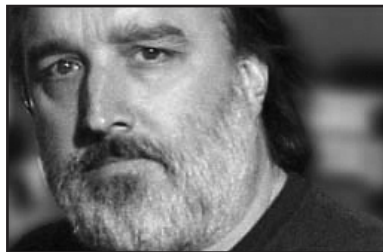

ANGRY FILMMAKER KELLEY BAKER SHOWING SHORTS AND CLIPS WEDNESDAY IN MSUM'S KING HALL

Independent filmmaker Kelley Baker, also known as "The Angry Filmmaker," will make a presentation of short films and feature clips at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 4 in MSUM's King Hall auditorium. Free and open to the public, it will be followed by a question and answer session with the filmmaker.



Baker has written and directed three full-length features, "Kicking Bird" (2005), "The Glass Care" (2001) and "Birddog" (1999).

He's also known for his work with other people. He was sound designer on six of Gus Van Sant's feature films including, "My Own Private Idaho," "Good Will Hunting," and "Finding Forrester." He designed the sound on Todd Haynes feature film, "Far From Heaven," with Dennis Quaid and Julieanne Moore. He was an editor and a sound designer for Will Vinton's "The Adventures of Mark Twain" and on four Claymation Specials for CBS.

Baker also wrote and directed eight short films that have aired on PBS, The Learning Channel, Canadian and Australian television. His films have

been shown at Film Festivals in London, Sydney, Annecy and Edinburgh, Sundance, Chicago and Mill Valley.

He is currently self distributing his short and feature films, and working on a book tentatively titled, "The Angry Filmmaker's Guide to Independent Filmmaking."

He's known as the Angry Filmmaker primarily because of his belief that "The corporate independent film world doesn't want you, or your movie. The odds are your film isn't going anywhere unless you do it yourself. That's what I am doing. I'm making movies, touring, teaching workshops, having screenings, and self distributing my work."

Independent filmmaker and screenwriter Tony Buba, who's made over 20 documentaries about the rise and fall of the Pennsylvania steel town of Braddock, his hometown, will present a 4 p.m. talk on the writer's craft and preside over a screening and discussion of one of his films at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct 10 in the university's Center for Business 111 as a feature of the Tom McGrath Visiting Writers Series.



Buba's work has been showcased on one-person shows at The Museum of Modern Art, the Whitney Museum of American Art, The Carnegie Museum of Art and more than 100 other museums and universities. He's currently producing an anthology of films under the working title "Laundromat."

RED RIVER WOMEN'S STUDIES

CONFERENCE HERE OCT. 20

The Sixth Annual Red River Women's Studies Conference will take place Friday, Oct. 20 from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in MSUM'S Comstock Memorial Union. The conference brings together scholars and students from college campuses throughout the Red River Valley to present their work on women and women's issues.

At this year's conference, papers will be presented by people from MSUM, NDSU, UND, St. Cloud State and Minot State University. Sessions will be dedicated to a diverse mixture

of topics, including women in politics, Medieval women, women in music, body image, and mentoring girls.

The keynote speaker for the conference will be Irene Kai, an award-winning artist, author and activist. She will be speaking on "What It Means to Be An American," particularly focusing on multiculturalism and the unconscious biases that separate us from each other. Kai recently published a book, "What Do You See?" and is the award-winning author of "The Golden Mountain: Beyond the American Dream." Recently Kai has been honored by the United Nations with the selection of her work as the signature image for the International Day of Peace. The keynote presentation will take place at the noon to 2 p.m. luncheon.

ERICKSON'S 5TH CAMPUS BIKE TOUR RAISES \$31,015 TO AID PART-TIME STUDENTS

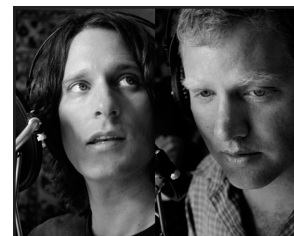
Robert Erickson, a former Minnesota State Colleges and Universities trustee, has raised \$31,015 on his fifth annual 2,300-mile bike tour to create scholarships for part-time students. To date, Erickson has raised more than \$290,000 over five years.

Erickson, 60, rode his bicycle to the 53 state college and university campuses. He was received with police escorts, receptions and other fund-raising efforts. Many supporters, including some college and university presidents and David Paskach, chair of the system's Board of Trustees, joined him. Paskach rode 101 miles with Erickson from Austin to Winona.

The Minnesota State Colleges and Universities Foundation and college and university foundations will distribute scholarships with donations generated from the bike tour.

Over the past 15 years, "Storyhill" has moved over 50,000 copies of their 12 albums without label support. They continue to tour and manage an online fan base that's 10,000 strong.

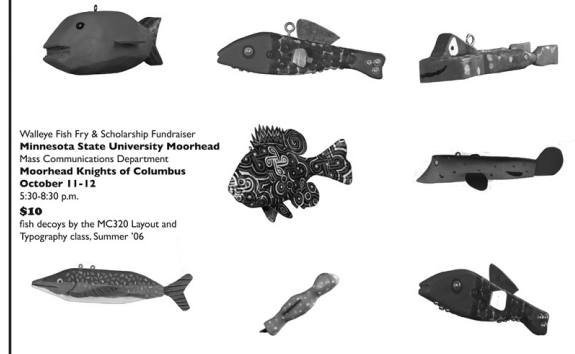
years at the Fortune Institute of Technology.

PLATO'S BEAUTY TOPIC OF PHILOSOPHY COLLOQUIUM 3 P.M. FRIDAY

Michelle Carpenter, Philosophy, will present her paper "Plato's Beauty" at the Philosophy Department Colloquium at 3 p.m. Friday, Oct. 6 in MacLean Hall 268. Scholars have always considered Plato's "Hippias Major" to end in failure. I, however, disagree with this view and argue that the dialogue provides the careful reader with an answer to what the Beautiful itself is. Additionally I will highlight the evidence we readers should focus on to understand why these suggestions need not fail for us, and how, properly understood, each of these suggestions really provides the same answer: the Beautiful is the appropriate use of wisdom in both public and private life to benefit oneself and others.
