NRP RELEASE, "FLOCK AND SHADOW," MAKES 2006 BOOK SENSE POETRY TOP TEN

Book Sense, a network of independent booksellers nationwide, has selected their 2006 Poetry Top Ten choices, and among them is the title "Flock & Shadow: New and Selected Poems" by Michael Hettich and published by MSUM's New Rivers Press.

Each month, Book Sense selects the most noteworthy of recent books based on hundreds of booksellers' recommendations.

A stunning collection spanning more than 20 years, "Flock & Shadow" traces the journey of a man—son, husband, father, poet—as he struggles to find meaning and comfort in a harsh universe. In well-crafted poems, Hettich questions, challenges, and examines the trials and triumphs of life. Hettich's poems have the uncanny ability to sympathize with nature, to listen and shape it in ways that simultaneously surprise and delight. While vivid images of flora and fauna inform this collection, the complexities of each poem evoke intrigue, doubt, and clarity, keeping any lasting or certain epiphanies dangling. Solace and wonder fill these poems. "Flock & Shadow: is a human song against the din and darkness of the modern world.

New Rivers Press (NRP) is one of the oldest continuously publishing nonprofit literary presses in the country with over 300 titles to its credit. NRP is dedicated to publishing new, emerging and established writers from Minnesota, the Midwest and New York City, from the many Americas, and from elsewhere in the world. Its dual mission is to publish enduring literature and to provide academic learning opportunities for MSUM students.

"Flock and Shadow," published last year, is 150 pages and is \$13.95.
