MSUM will host a panel discussion on "Emergency Preparedness: Before and After 9/11" from noon to 1:15 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 11 in Science Lab 104.

The panel discussion will explore how local, regional, and federal emergency response and homeland security agencies changed their business continuity, disaster recovery and emergency response thinking and practices after the events of Sept. 11, 2001.



Panelists for the event include Moorhead Fire Chief Joel Hewitt; Bryan Green, emergency management director for the Clay County Sheriff's Department; and Michael Parks, director of Security at MSUM. Alan Breuer, the university's safety administrator, will serve as the event's moderator.

Public safety agencies will have display tables available with emergency preparedness and response information.

it refers to products that overemphasize new features to the detriment of other design goals such as simplicity, compactness and stability.

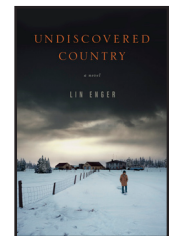
NATURALIZATION CEREMONY ON CAMPUS NEXT WEEK

MSUM English professor Lin Enger, author of the recently released novel "Undiscovered Country," kicks off this year's Tom McGrath Visiting Writer's Series with a reading from his book at 8 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 18 preceded by a 4 p.m. talk on the writer's craft, both in the student union's Comstock Room 101.



Enger's novel was released this summer by Little, Brown and Company, one of the major publishing houses in the country, which also publishes the novels of James Patterson, David Baldacci, Ian Rankin and Nelson DeMille. Books on Tape has already bought audio rights, and so far it's scheduled for translation into Italian and Spanish.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS HIT RECORD NUMBERS: 382 THIS FALL

International students on campus this fall total 382, over 100 more than last year at this time, according to Greg Wymer, director of the International Student Affairs department here.

Those students—157 of them new this year—represent 53 different countries. The largest group by far, 172, come from Nepal. The next largest group is from Sri Lanka (28 students) followed by Japan (24 students).

Wymer said improved efficiency in processing international student applications and increased

marketing efforts have made a difference. He said his office processed more than 420 international applications for fall semester.

Brian Klinnert, a 2007 MSUM criminal justice major from Moorhead, is a new full-time campus security officer here. He'll cover the 11 p.m. to 7 a.m. shift and supervise student workers.

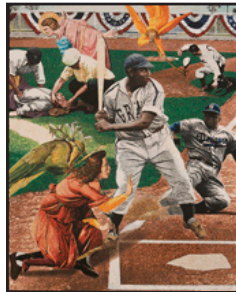


He'll join campus security officers Marc Baestch and Mitch Osland (half parking, half security) working under director of security Michael Parks.

KENNEDY CENTER RECOGNIZES MSUM STUDENT FOR HIS PLAYWRITING

Richard Paul Klein, a second-year student in MSUM's MFA Creative Writing program, was recently recognized by the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival for excellence in playwriting. His play, "An Old Album," won the regional KCACTF highest honor for a one-act play this past January. While not every award winning play at the regional level receives national recognition, An Old Album was selected as one of four finalists of the John Cauble Award for Outstanding Short Play.



In April, Klein was also one of only five students across the nation to receive a 2008 National Selection Team Fellowship to attend the National Festival. During the National Festival at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, his play was given a full concert reading performed by Equity actors from Washington D.C.'s Woolly Mammoth Theatre Company and directed by professional director Lee Mikeska Gardner.

Following the National Festival, the artistic director of the Kennedy Center, Gregg Henry, offered Klein a fellowship to attend the 2008 Kennedy Center Summer Playwriting Intensive along with the opportunity to participate in the final days of the National New Play Network MFA Playwright's Workshop.

From July 4 to July 22. Klein was a guest artist at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts. During the Summer Playwriting Intensive Richard joined university students, faculty and young professionals from across the country in writing workshops, discussions of the business of playwriting with the program's director, Gary Garrison, and a wide range of distinguished guest artists including: Pulitzer Prize winner Marsha Norman; New School instructor and playwright, Michael Weller;

playwright and founding member of The Playwright's Center, Barbara Field; Pulitzer Prize nominated Playwright, Heather McDonald; University of DePaul instructor, playwright and actor, Carlos Murillo; University of DePaul acting instructor Catherine Weidner; and performance artist and playwright, Carl Hancock Rux. Some of Washington, D.C.'s leading playwrights, dramaturgs, literary managers, artistic directors, actors and producers also gave talks and provided one-on-one response sessions to the Klein's most recent work.

The MSUM Theatre Arts department will stage the world premiere of "An Old Album" this December.

The production will then travel this coming January to Lawrence, Kansas, to be performed at the KCACTF Regional Festival. Klein has also been invited back for the 2009 Summer Playwriting Intensive to serve as an assistant to Gary Garrison.

**MSUM HOSTS SYMPOSIUM
ON TEACHING ENGLISH
AS A SECOND LANGUAGE**

MSUM is hosting the TEAM Work Symposium: Teaching ELLs with Academics in Mind on Sept. 19-20. The theme is "Braiding the Strands for English Language Learners." All events are open to educators in elementary, high school, and higher education, and anyone who works with ELLs.

Sylvia Linan Thompson, associate professor at the University of Texas, Austin, is the pre-conference trainer and keynote speaker on Friday, Sept. 19 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The focus will be on oral language and reading interventions for ELLs. The conference begins Friday at 5:30 p.m. with Linan Thompson giving the keynote on "Instruction for English Language Learners: Looking back and looking forward."

Linan Thompson has developed and examined reading interventions for struggling readers who are monolingual English speakers, English language learners, and bilingual students acquiring Spanish literacy. She has authored numerous articles, chapters and two books on these topics.

Concurrent sessions will be held Saturday, Sept. 20, which will be divided into three categories: Getting Started Teaching English Language Learners, The Transition to Higher Education, and Advanced Scholarship and Education for ESL Teachers.

Conference attendees will have the chance to win a trip to the Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages conference March 26-28, 2009 in Denver, Colo. Two trips for higher education faculty and two trips for K-12 faculty will be given away.

Cost for the pre-conference and conference is \$85, which includes the Friday evening dinner and lunches. One undergraduate or graduate credit is available at an additional cost for those who attend the both days. An assignment will be due after the conference. Continuing Education Units are also available.

A special conference price of \$30 is offered to college students with a valid student ID. An optional one credit is available to participants who attend both the pre-conference and entire conference.
