igaly, untilinately 10 7010 hands with the allied forces working northward through Serbia.

Thus what their opponents regard as the weakest of the Teutonic allies, Austro-Hungary, would be invaded without the loss of life than at at-tempt to drive the Germans from France and Belgium would entail.

Dardanelles Attack Continues.

Meanwhile, it is argued, the bom-bardment of the Dardanelles will be continued as the shortest, if the most costly, method of crushing Turkey. Report that Smyrna again has been

bombarded lacks official confirmation and the absence of news from the Dardanelles is taken by some to mean that important operations are under way, the details of which later will be

made known. British forces in occupying Warm-bad, German Southwest Africa, as of-ficially announced have taken what is considered the southern capital and the terminus of the railway system.

Excluding active military operations, the questions of munitions and alcohol dominate the public mind in Great Britain.

Tips Mean Bread and Butter. Chicago, April 8 .- Pullman sleeping car porters went on the witness stand before the United States commission on industrial relations and told the commission just what the tipping sys-

tem means to them.
It means bread and butter. They could not pay expenses on the road with the salaries, to say nothing of paying rents and maintaining families, they said.

There was other interesting testimony, including a statement that Pullman car conductors do not consider it dishonest to "knock down" on seat sales enough to pay their expenses on the road. These expenses average \$30 a month and come out of salaries

ranging from \$70 to \$95 a month.

The witness who made this statement was H. H. Sewall of Chicago, a former conductor.

Italy Pushes Preparations.

Rome, April 8.—There has been no outward change in the situation regarding the maintenance of Italian neutrality but military preparations are being pushed with ever increasing vigor. Information obtained from re-liable sources, however, is to the ef-fect that negotiations are being con-tinued and that there yet is hope of reaching a satisfactory understanding so that war may be avoided.
